








Notre Dame Destination Data 2024



Competing the UCAS application process

From January 2025	Lower sixth students complete Higher Education prep and research in tutorials
From April 2025	Students research degree subjects and universities, checking entry requirements. Students write the first draft of their personal statement. Students check predicted grades with teachers.
From May 2025	Full 'how to' guide provided on how to complete the application (available to parents on our website)

July-Aug 2025	Students attend open days, taster events or summer schools. Students complete work experience.	
Sept 2025 onwards	Students complete UCAS application during tutorials.	
	5 choices (1 subject, 5 universities).	
	Opportunity to have Personal Statement checked by a visiting Uni.	
	Students are updated via UCAS Track.	
	Students choose their firm and insurance offers.	
August 2026	A-level results day – place confirmed!	















Important Deadlines



15th September 2025

Internal deadline for applications to Oxford & Cambridge, medicine, dentistry and veterinary science courses.

13th October 2025

Internal deadline for competitive courses (those requiring A/B grades, health, teaching, social work, Russell group Universities).

21st November 2025

Internal deadline for all UCAS applications to be submitted.

14th January 2026

Final UCAS deadline.















Predicted Grades

- These are set by subject teachers and are aspirational: they reflect the highest grade a teacher believes the student could achieve for their subject.
- It is important that students check that their predicted grades are in line with the entry requirements for their chosen courses.

Work Experience

Essential for degrees in:

- Healthcare
- Social work
- Teaching



- ✓ Must be completed before applying to UCAS
- ✓ Make the most of Virtual WEX opportunities
- ✓ Work Experience is open to all students but compulsory for those students on a T Level course who attend an extended industry placement.















University Access Schemes

- For students who meet certain criteria.
 e.g. first generation to progress to HE,
 postcode, household income.
- Students participate in a programme of activities (can include workshops, visits on campus, e-mentoring and summer school).
- May result in a reduced grade offer.

















Foundation year/degree



- A foundation year helps your child to develop the skills needed for higher education study. For example, if they haven't studied the subjects required for a particular career.
- A foundation degree is equivalent to the first two years of an undergraduate degree and can be 'topped up' with another year of study.















Support for Students

Make sure any personal circumstance that may need support is declared on the UCAS form.

Universities can provide:

- Academic support
- Special arrangements in exams
- Accommodation
- Financial allowance

Every year, over 60,000 students with a physical and/or mental health condition, long-term illness, or learning difference apply through UCAS to study at a university or college in the UK, and access a range of support available to help with their studies, day-to-day activities, travel, or lifestyle. Would you consider yourself as living with any of the following: *

No disability

You have a social/communication impairment such as Asperger's syndrome/other autistic spectrum disorder

You are blind or have a serious visual impairment uncorrected by glasses

You are deaf or have a serious hearing impairment

You have a long standing illness or health condition such as cancer, HIV, diabetes, chronic heart disease, or epilepsy

You have a mental health condition, such as depression, schizophrenia or anxiety disorder

You have a specific learning difficulty such as dyslexia, dyspraxia or AD(H)D

You have physical impairment or mobility issues, such as difficulty using your arms or using a wheelchair or crutches

You have a disability, impairment or medical condition that is not listed above

You have two or more impairments and/or disabling medical conditions















What should students be doing now?

- Research
- Extracurricular activities in/out of College – open days
- Work experience
- Go beyond the syllabus
- Focus on this year's studies

Sign up

Open Days

Attend virtual events and open days – you may have a different perspective.















Alternatives to University

Higher or degree apprenticeship / school leaver programme

- In work full-time, paid a wage, and studying for a qualification equivalent to year one, year two or year three of a degree.
- The employer usually pays for your child's qualification.
- These are competitive and students must start looking now if this is a possible pathway for them.

Employment

We can support your child to look for full-time work after college.

For both options, gaining work experience while still at Notre Dame is essential.















Alternatives to University



Gap year: a year out to work, volunteer or travel before attending university.

- Your child should plan their gap year during upper sixth.
- They may want to take part in activities that enhance their university application.
- Travel and volunteering could help your child to become more confident and enable them to experience other cultures.
- Students can either apply in Sept 2025 for deferred entry (start in Sept 2027) or apply in Sept 2026 (externally) for Sept 2027 entry.

















Alternatives to University

How we support non-UCAS students

We identify all lower sixth who don't make an application to university through UCAS, or who want to consider alternative options, and offer them the following support:

- A careers appointment with one of the team.
- Regular bulletins regarding employment and apprenticeship opportunities etc.
- Workshops covering how to plan a gap year, write a CV, and search for job or apprenticeship vacancies.
- Ongoing follow up communication from the Careers Team once they have left to check each student's progress.
