



Important Deadlines

<u>September 11 2023</u>: internal deadline for applications to Oxford & Cambridge, medicine, dentistry and veterinary science courses.

October 16 2023: internal deadline for competitive courses (those requiring A/B grades, and health, teaching, social work).

November 20 2023: internal deadline for all UCAS applications to be submitted.

January 31 2024: final UCAS deadline.

Experience of the Workplace

Essential for degrees in:

- Healthcare
- Social work
- Teaching
- Competitive courses



Must be completed before applying to UCAS.

Make the most of *Virtual work experience opportunities*

Work experience is open to all students but compulsory for those students on a L6 Diploma course. T Level students also attend an extended industry placement.





Assessment Results and Aspirations

- University offers are based on students' GCSE results and predicted grades. So please encourage students to take CAP assessments seriously.
- College attendance & punctuality are key.
- Students can start researching course options now. Please encourage them to attend university open days.







Predicted Grades

- These are set by subject teachers and are aspirational: they reflect the highest grade a teacher believes the student could achieve for their subject.
- It is important that students check that their predicted grades are in line with the entry requirements for their chosen courses.

University Access Schemes

- For students who meet certain criteria.
 e.g. first generation to progress to HE, postcode, household income.
- Students participate in a programme of activities (can include workshops, visits on campus, e-mentoring and summer school).
- May result in a reduced grade offer.
- Students to review schemes on Moodle Careers.







Support for Students with Disabilities

Make sure the disability is declared on the UCAS form.

Universities can provide:

- Academic support
- Special arrangements in exams
- Accommodation

Students can also apply for Disabled Students' Allowance.

How can you support your child?

Research

Use the parents/guardian section on the UCAS website

Sign up

 Sign up for updates from UCAS and get everything you need to know about the application process direct to your inbox.

Open Days

 Attend virtual events and open days – you may have a different perspective.











Gap year: a year out to work, volunteer or travel before attending university.

- Your child should plan their gap year during upper sixth.
- They may want to take part in activities that enhance their university application.
- Travel and volunteering could help your child to become more confident and enable them to experience other cultures.
- Students can either apply in Sept 2023 for deferred entry to Sept 2025, or apply in Sept 2024 for Sept 2025 entry.





Foundation year or foundation degree

- A foundation year helps your child to develop the skills needed for higher education study. For example, if they haven't studied the subjects required for a particular career.
- A foundation degree is equivalent to the first two years of an undergraduate degree, and can be 'topped up' with another year of study.







Higher or degree apprenticeship / school leaver programme

- In work full-time, paid a wage, and studying for a qualification equivalent to year one, year two or year three of a degree.
- The employer usually pays for your child's qualification.

Employment

We can support your child to look for full-time work after college.

For both options, gaining work experience while still at Notre Dame is essential.





How we support non-UCAS students

We identify all lower sixth who don't make an application to university through UCAS, or who want to consider alternative options, and offer them the following support:

- A careers appointment with one of the team.
- Regular bulletins regarding employment and apprenticeship opportunities etc.
- Workshops covering how to plan a gap year, write a CV, and search for job or apprenticeship vacancies.
- Ongoing follow up phone calls, emails etc. from the Careers Team to check each student's progress.

TUITON FEES

£9,250 per year

100% covered by a government loan – paid straight from the Government to your university

[If you are a UK student and are going to university for the first time]





THE 'MAINTENANCE' LOAN

- Based on household income and where you live
- Household income:
 - Your parents, if you're under 25 and live with them or depend on them financially
 - One of your parents and their partner, if you're under 25 and live with them or depend on them financially
 - Tested on 'previous' tax year (parents of September 2023 entrants will be tested on 2021/22 earnings)
 - If your income drops by 15% or more from the previous tax year, you can ask for income details for the current tax year to be assessed instead
- Paid directly into your bank account in three instalments at the start of each term









STUDENT JOBS

- Leeds Beckett student ambassadors: over £12 per hour

- Consider having a job related to your degree or your career aspirations
- Don't let it take precedence over your studies



BURSARIES AND SCHOLARSHIPS

- Offered by the Government and by individual universities
- It's unlikely universities will come looking for you: do your own research

STUDENT DEBT AND INTEREST

When you finish your studies, the Tuition Fee Loan and Maintenance Loan will be rolled into one.

Interest rates will be RPI During studies and until full repayment (or 40 years).

LOAN REPAYMENTS

You will not pay anything until you are earning over £25,000 (figures for 2023)

Pay back at a rate of 9p for every £1 over the threshold

What is an Apprenticeship?



A real job with a real salary and real training (Available to anybody aged 16+ with no upper age limit)



Involves "on-the-job" training and "off-the-job" learning



Leads to a nationally recognised qualification, which is linked to the job



Co-ordinated by a training provider (this may be a college or university)



Approved study programme, involving block release, day release, or studying on-the-job



MythBusters

Myth 1: Apprenticeships are for people who don't do well at school

• Apprenticeships are simply an alternative route into skilled employment. Earn while you learn. Gain on the job experience and work on real life projects. Fast-track to a successful career.

Myth 2. Apprentices are poorly paid

• (Ages 18-20) £5.28 rising in 2nd year to NMW £7.49 per hour (April 2023). Many employers pay more than this. It is also important to take into account that the company are paying for the qualification as well as paying a salary.


Myth 3: Apprenticeships are only for manual or trade jobs

• Some of the most popular sectors for apprentices include construction, sports, health and social care, IT services and engineering, business, fashion, law administration, finance and more.

Myth 4: Apprentices are given all the boring tasks

 Apprentices are given the opportunity to work on exciting projects and contribute to real change within an organisation, and provide real value to businesses.

When the apprentice is in the second year of their apprenticeship, they must be paid at least National Minimum Wage for their age

Benefits of apprenticeships

- Apprentices are employed and paid a wage – you can earn whilst you learn
- Job ready Develop soft skills and reallife experience of the job
- No Student Debt!
 Degree Apprentices will gain a full degree without needing to pay student fees!

- Designed by employers to allow apprentices to acquire the skills they need to do the job. Apprentices can apply their learning to real life projects
- Clear progression pathway through the company - potential to move from level 3 up
- Exposure to other training available within the company



Choosing between Uni and Apprenticeships?

- Apply for both! Try not to think about it as university or an apprenticeship.
 An apprenticeship can lead to degree-level qualifications
- Apprenticeship schemes have different application processes and deadlines deadlines are set by individual employers, and you'll apply for them directly
- You're not restricted to one apprenticeship application
- Higher/degree apprenticeships more competitive limited number of vacancies
- A degree apprenticeship is not the easy option- you'll be starting a job while getting to grips with studying for a degree, and potentially relocating
- Consider applying for degree apprenticeships all-round the country
- If you can't find a degree apprenticeship, consider applying for Level
 3/4 apprenticeship and then working your way up




